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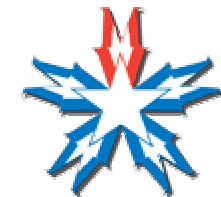

Dr. Hind Jarrah – Texas Muslim Women Foundation

Hind was born in Beirut Lebanon to Palestinian Parents. She studied in Islamic Schools (Madrassah) for Elementary and Junior High levels and in the International College for High school. She graduated from the American University in Beirut with a B. Sc. In pharmacy. Came to the States with Husband in 1975 and graduated with a PhD in pharmacology from UTHSC Dallas in 1980. They were blessed with two little girls by that time, and a third one by 1982.

During 1982, Hind became a founding member of the Arabic Heritage Society, a non profit organization that served to educate and preserve the Arabic culture within the DFW area. AHS taught children of Arab American Parents and the community at large about the Arabic culture through an Arabic language weekend school, exhibits, and class room presentations, fashion shows. These were held in area schools, international festivals, churches, teachers' workshops, and libraries. During the years Hind served in various capacities as AHS, president, treasurer, and Board member.

Realizing that that soon she and her husband would be experiencing the empty nest syndrome, with all three of daughters in college. Hind decided to go back to school and return to work in Science major, so by 2000, She graduated from UTD with a masters in Cognition and Neuroscience, hoping to work in Alzheimer disease research; however, in 2001, September 11 happened and Hind's life was changed forever. She became very active in Interfaith dialogue, outreach and educational efforts about Islam and Muslims.

In 2004 She was invited to the committee on faith and feminism at Dallas Women's Foundation and became aware of the tremendous impact women' organizations have in effecting positive change in Society. Therefore in 2005 Hind co founded the Texas Muslim Women foundation to empower, promote and support Muslim Women, and hopefully contribute positive change in the life of women and girls within the Muslim Community and the community at large.

Bill Gates announces new US\$255 million grant for ending polio

The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation has awarded US\$255 million to Rotary International in the global effort to eradicate polio, bringing the total committed by Rotary and the Gates Foundation to \$555 million.

Shortly after meeting with incoming district governors from the four countries where the wild poliovirus is endemic -- Afghanistan, India, Nigeria, and Pakistan -- Bill Gates announced the new grant on Wednesday morning at the International Assembly in San Diego, California, USA.

“Rotarians, government leaders, and health professionals have made a phenomenal commitment to get us to a point at which polio afflicts only a small number of the world’s

children,” Gates said. “However, complete elimination of the poliovirus is difficult and will continue to be difficult for a number of years.

Rotary in particular has inspired my own personal commitment to get deeply involved in achieving eradication.”

“We are going to end polio now,” affirmed Robert S. Scott, chair of RI’s International PolioPlus Committee.

In response to the new \$255 million Gates Foundation grant, Rotary will raise \$100 million in matching funds. In November 2007, RI received a \$100 million Gates Foundation grant, which Rotary committed to match by raising \$100 million.

The two Gates Foundation challenge grants now total \$355 million. Rotary International’s matching effort in response is called Rotary’s US\$200 Million Challenge, which must be completed by 30 June 2012.

The \$255 million grant is one of the largest challenge grants ever given by the Gates Foundation and the largest received by Rotary in its 104-year history. Rotary will spend the grant in direct support of immunization activities carried out by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, which is spearheaded by [RI and its partners](#), the World Health Organization, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and UNICEF. Rotary will distribute the funds through grants to WHO and UNICEF.

The participation of Rotary clubs and individual Rotarians in Rotary’s US\$200 Million Challenge remains crucial to its success. Rotary has raised nearly \$73 million toward this amount: \$62 million in contributions and \$11 million in commitments. Each club is being challenged to organize a public [fundraiser](#) annually for the next three years. In October, The Rotary Foundation Trustees approved special Paul Harris Fellow Recognition, which begins 1 July, featuring a certificate with the End Polio Now logo.

Polio eradication has been Rotary’s top priority since 1985, with more than \$1.2 billion contributed to the effort. Gates praised Rotary for providing the volunteers, advocates, and donors who have helped bring about a 99 percent decline in the number of polio cases. “The world would not be where it is without Rotary, and it won’t get where it needs to go without Rotary,” he said.

The final hurdle still is ahead, said RI President-elect John Kenny. This grant shows that the Gates Foundation is just as committed as Rotary to ridding the world of this disease, he said.

Gates also shared with the incoming district governors and Rotary leaders a story from his trip to India in November, when he held a nine-month-old girl afflicted with polio in his arms in a slum in East Delhi.

“She obviously didn’t understand why people were poking her legs and looking so serious. But she’ll never be able to kick a ball around, never be able to play hide-and-seek with her friends, because she has polio,” Gates said. “As I held Hashmin, I thought, We can end this.”

“We don’t know exactly when the last child will be affected. But we *do* have the vaccines to wipe it out,” he said. “Countries *do* have the will to deploy all the tools at their disposal. If we all have the fortitude to see this effort through to the end, then we *will* eradicate polio.”

In addition, the governments of the United Kingdom and Germany announced they have respectively committed \$150 million and \$130 million to eradicate polio, which will not count toward Rotary’s challenge.

Government support is key to polio eradication efforts, said Scott.

2009-10 Rotary International Theme

With over a century of successful Rotary service, we are proud to be confident of a future in which generation after generation of Rotarians will bring hope to those in need and peace to a world full of conflict. We see ourselves as part of a great Rotary tradition, as links in a chain joining our future to our past. If that chain is to continue, every link in it must be strong. As Mohandas Gandhi once told us, “The future depends on what we do in the present.” If we hope to see Rotary continue through a second century, we cannot simply leave well alone. If the road ahead is to be long, then we will need a map to travel it — and we have that map. With input from Rotarians worldwide, Rotary International has developed a strategic plan with seven priorities that set the course for a strong future. Now is the time for us to take the initiative to make this plan a reality:

- **Eradicating polio is our first and main priority.** Through our fundraising challenge, we can help to provide the resources to finish this crucial job and keep our promise to the world.

- **Advancing the recognition and public image of Rotary** will help Rotary attract new members and cooperation from other organizations. PolioPlus has given Rotary prominence on the world stage. Now is the time to build on our international reputation by promoting our local and global service activities to the media and to our communities.

- **Increasing Rotary’s capacity to provide service** speaks to the heart of Rotary’s mission. Every Rotarian can contribute to reaching this goal by volunteering a little more time, talent, and enthusiasm along all four Avenues of Service. In 2009-10, I will encourage Rotarians to continue to focus their service efforts in the areas of water, health and hunger, and literacy — vital issues that clubs have been addressing most effectively in recent years.

- **Expanding membership globally** in both numbers and quality is a key priority because everything Rotary hopes to accomplish depends on its members. Each of us is responsible for bringing in qualified new members. Too few Rotarians fulfill this responsibility, and only Rotarians have the ability to increase our numbers by inviting others to join their club.

- **Emphasizing Rotary’s unique vocational service commitment** will enable us to distinguish Rotary from other service and humanitarian organizations. By demonstrating our strong commitment to high ethical standards in our professional lives, we can provide a model for our colleagues, our employees, our customers — even our competitors — to follow.

- **Optimizing leadership talents within RI** is essential to Rotary’s future. Each of us should take a leadership role, whether it be heading a club committee or service project or serving at the district or international level. All Rotarians are leaders in their businesses and professions; let us be leaders in Rotary as well.

- **Fully implementing the strategic planning process to ensure continuity** will allow us to make a smooth transition during the annual change in leadership at the club, district, and international levels.

Although this strategic plan was approved by the RI Board, its implementation depends on you. The RI president cannot invite members to join your club. The RI Board cannot organize and promote a fundraiser in your community to support polio eradication. Nor can any senior leader demonstrate Rotary’s code of ethics in your workplace. The Future of Rotary Is in Your Hands.

This simple truth will be our theme for 2009-10, serving as a constant reminder of the personal responsibility that each Rotarian holds. Winston Churchill once said: “The price of greatness is responsibility.” Rotary is a great organization, and it has the potential to become even greater — if each one of us rises to the challenge and takes responsibility for its future.

In Rotary, each one of us has been assigned a job. Its title is Rotarian. Our duties are to offer relevant service locally and internationally, and to expand our club’s capacity for service by inviting professional and business leaders to become members and promoting a positive image locally. Our job description also calls for each of us to be an example of ethical behavior in our professional and personal lives, to act as leaders in our club and community, and to fully support Rotary’s highest priority of polio eradication.

The job of Rotarian brings immense benefits. We enjoy incomparable fellowship with one another and the great personal satisfaction that comes from serving others. If you believe in Rotary and its power to make a difference in the world, it is time to stand up and commit to doing the best job you can — with all of your mind, your heart, and your soul. The Future of Rotary Is in Your Hands.
