I was born in the middle of the war, to a Texas farming family, in the mid 1940's, and yes it was in Collin County Texas just outside of McKinney. Lost my dad at a very young age, and my mother moved to the big town of Plano. Where I went to the only school public school in Plano. By my 12th year Plano had three schools, not like the 70 that is in town today.

I am married to a wonderful woman that puts up with all of my Rotary work. I have 5 kids, she has 2 kids & 4 step-children, and together we have a total of 11 kids, 14 grand-kids & 5 great-grand-kids. She said that she is too young to have great-grand-kids so she has 19 grand-kids.

I was in one of the first groups to go to the new El Centro Collage in down town Dallas, were I majored in chemistry. I worked to pay my collage expense as a butcher and also at a 7-11 store. With my chemistry degree I went to work as the chemist at a plant in Plano and worked with the chrome plating Department.

I was offered a position as the Plant Facility Engineer for a large company that built eighteen wheelers, and military ground support equipment. I was made the military liaison for the company to the Pentagon, and was listed as a member of the Air Force for over seven years.

I applied for a job with a NJ company to be the local Engineer for three states and setup the new installations, train the customers and service all types of Bio Medical equipment. Within two years with this company I was promoted to Sr. Field Service Engineer and started working in forty of the fifty states and doing major set ups in other counties like Mexico, South America, Germany, Taiwan, India, Thailand, England and Australia.

I was very honored to meet Dr. Jonas Salk at the Salk institute of Biological Studies in 1994 just one year before his death, I taught fermentation technology in one of his classes.

I have taught college chemistry labs, have a Texas teaching certificate for high school pre-engineering, a counselor for students at three PISD youth camps, Sunday teacher for 5 years, Superintendent for a VBS for two years, Dads club President for seven years, PTO President for one year. President of my HOA for the past 12 years, President of the Plano Homeowners Council, President of Long Associates and Vice-President of my wife's insurance company.

At the age of 67, with 29 years in the Bio-Medical field service business, and many things that I would like to do for me, my family, and the good of Rotary, I retired. But, I only retired from my 40 hour plus work week. Now I am working about 80 hours a week and loving it.

I am a member of the Plano Sunrise Rotary Club, were I am the Blood Drive chairman, the Rotaract sponsor for Collin College Rotaract Club and the Club Project Director. This year I was the Chairman for the Oktoberfest 2011. Next year I will be the club treasurer. I am also the district 5810 chairman for the Blood Drives and the Rotaract Clubs. I am very happy to have a certificate of Graduation from the Rotary International Leadership Institute class #21.

One of the best parts of my Rotary work is helping start a new Rotaract Club, and knowing that I am working with the young people that will keep Rotary going in the right direction for many years to come.

World Interact Week

World Interact Week is celebrated every year during the week of 5 November to commemorate the founding of the first Interact club in 1962.

To mark this occasion with Interactors and Rotarians around the world, Interact clubs, in partnership with their sponsor Rotary clubs, are encouraged to participate in joint projects during World Interact Week.

Rotary has the power to end polio, says Jack Hanna

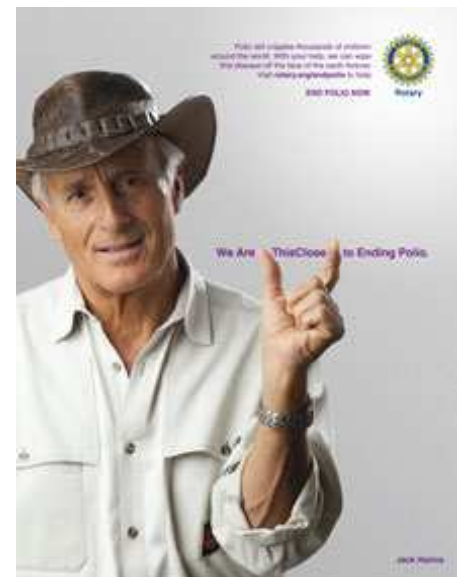
Jack Hanna, director emeritus of the Columbus Zoo in Ohio, USA, is best known as the star of the syndicated television series [*Jack Hanna's Into the Wild*](#). But he has also been recognized for his work rehabilitating victims of the genocide in Rwanda. Hanna, a participant in Rotary's ["This Close" polio awareness campaign](#), spoke to RI News about his family's experience with polio, and the importance of Rotary's efforts to eradicate the disease.

RI News: Your brother contracted polio when you were a child. What impact did that have on you?

Hanna: My brother and his friend both contracted polio at about the same time in the '50s. He was eight at the time, and I was only five; I didn't really understand the disease and its complications. Back then, people didn't really know what caused it. We all had to be careful where we went. We had to be very cautious that nobody else would get it. It's a terrible disease, and a lot of people who contracted it back then didn't survive. The polio went to my brother's legs, and he was forced to wear braces. After therapy, he was able to work through it.

RI News: How would you describe the impact of campaigns like "This Close" and End Polio Now?

Hanna: You mention World Polio Day in the United States, and people don't always understand the importance. Polio is a deadly disease in certain countries, and many people don't realize that. Eradicating the disease is important. It's great that Rotary is out there and



cares about this. As an international organization, Rotary has the power in numbers to make this happen.

RI News: What other humanitarian efforts are you involved with?

Hanna: I work with St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Columbus, Ohio, where we have raised \$400,000 a year for the hospital. I also work with Partners in Conservation in Rwanda, which runs a school to help children of the genocide. The best thing in life is being able to help someone else.

RI News: You seem to have a lot in common with Rotary's mission. What is your impression of Rotary and Rotarians?

Hanna: When I think about humanitarian service, I always think of Rotary. It's amazing how your name is always out there in every community. Rotarians practice what they preach. They're always there, where they're needed most.
