Dr. Calvin J. Spann – Tuskegee Airman



In 1943 Calvin J. Spann left Rutherford High School to go into the Army Air Corps to start aviation cadet training. Calvin's high school graduation was the next month. His sister Carolyn was there to accept his diploma.

Mr. Spann's orders sent him to Kessler Field, Mississippi; when he arrived he was informed that the Army Air Corps did not train Black cadets. A week later, he was sent to Tuskegee, Alabama for the Cadet training. Calvin Spann received his wings at Tuskegee, graduating in Class 44G.

His next station of duty was Walterboro, South Carolina. There he trained in the P-47 (Thunderbolt) for combat and overseas duty. At the completion of training Lieutenant Spann was sent to Italy as a replacement combat pilot and given an instruction manual to fly the P51 Mustang. He became a member of the 100th Fighter Squadron, a part of the 332nd Fighter Group under the command of Col. Benjamin O. Davis, Jr. Lt. Spann flew 26 combat missions before the end of the war in Europe and terminated his tour of duty in Italy.

After returning to the United States, he was stationed at Lockbourne Army Air Base, Columbus, Ohio. Lt. Spann was separated from active duty here, in 1946. Lt. Spann made several attempts to seek employment with commercial airlines. He was denied a career in the industry, just as his comrades he served side by side with, due to racial discrimination. Lt. Spann remained in the Air Force Reserves until 1961 when he was honorably discharged.

On February 28, 2006 the United States Congress approved the bill sponsored by Rep. Charles B. Rangel, (Dem.-NY), to honor the Tuskegee Airmen with the Congressional Gold Medal of Honor and on March 27, 2006, the United States Senate passed legislation, sponsored by Sen. Carl Levin (Dem.-MI), authorizing President Bush to award the Congressional Gold Medal of Honor to the Tuskegee Airmen. The Congressional Gold Medal of Honor was awarded to the Tuskegee Airmen on March 29, 2007 in the capitol rotunda in Washington, D.C. In May 2006 Spann received the degree, Doctor of Public Service from Tuskegee University, earning the distinguished title of Doctor. Dr. Spann has also been inducted into the New Jersey Aviation Hall of Fame as well as the Texas Aviation Hall of Fame.

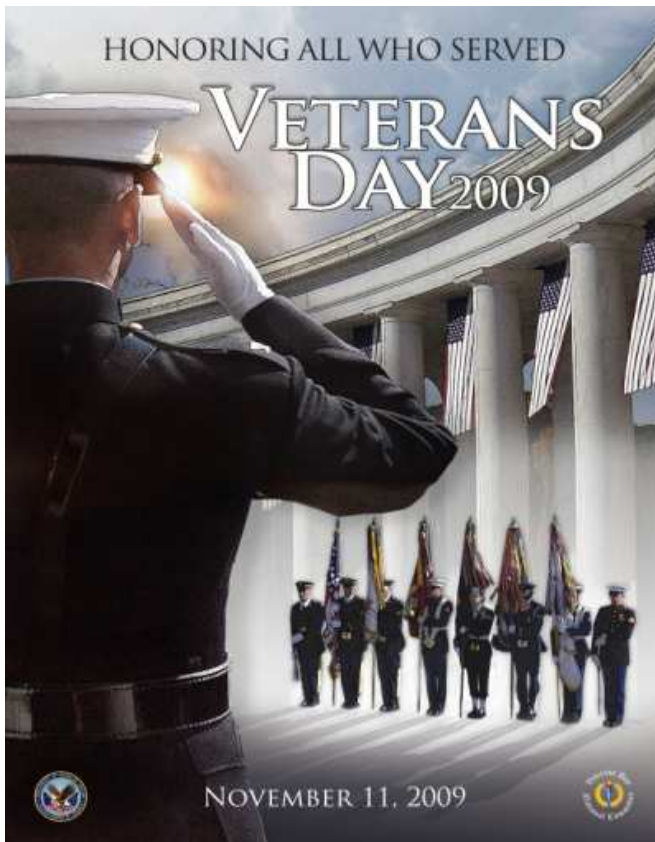
After a life long residency in New Jersey, Dr. Spann relocated to Texas to be closer to his grandchildren.

Here is the speech President Obama should give in Oslo on Dec. 10



“Let me begin by thanking the Nobel committee for awarding me this prize, the highest award to which any statesman can aspire. As I said on the day it was announced, ‘I do not feel that I deserve to be in the company of so many of the transformative figures who’ve been honored by this prize.’ Therefore, upon reflection, I cannot accept this award on my behalf at all.

“But I will accept it on behalf of the most important peacekeepers in the world for the last century — the men and women of the U.S. Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps.

“I will accept this award on behalf of the American soldiers who landed on Omaha Beach on June 6, 1944, to liberate Europe

from the grip of Nazi fascism. I will accept this award on behalf

of the soldiers and sailors who fought on the high seas and forlorn islands in the Pacific to free Asia from Japanese tyranny in World War II.

“I will accept this award on behalf of the U.S. airmen who in June 1948 broke the Soviet blockade of Berlin with an airlift of food and fuel so that West Berliners could continue to live free. I will accept this award on behalf of the tens of thousands of American soldiers who protected Europe from communist dictatorship throughout the 50 years of the Cold War.

“I will accept this award on behalf of the American soldiers who stand guard today at outposts in the mountains and deserts of Afghanistan to give that country, and particularly its women and girls, a chance to live a decent life free from the Taliban’s religious totalitarianism.

“I will accept this award on behalf of the American men and women still on patrol in Iraq, helping to protect its fledgling government as it tries to organize the rarest of things in that region — another free and fair election.

“I will accept this award on behalf of all the American soldiers who have gone on repeated humanitarian rescue missions after earthquakes and floods, from the mountains of Pakistan to the coasts of Indonesia. I will accept this award on behalf of American soldiers who serve in the peacekeeping force in the Sinai desert that has kept relations between Egypt and Israel stable ever since the Camp David treaty was signed.

“I will accept this award on behalf of all the U.S. airmen and sailors today who keep the sea lanes open and free in the Pacific and Atlantic so world trade can flow unhindered between nations.

“Finally, I will accept this award on behalf of my grandfather, Stanley Dunham, who arrived at Normandy six weeks after D-Day, and on behalf of my great-uncle, Charlie Payne, who was among those soldiers who liberated part of the Nazi concentration camp of Buchenwald.

“Members of the Nobel committee, I accept this award on behalf of all these American men and women soldiers, past and present, because I know — and I want you to know — that there is no peace without peacekeepers.

“Until the words of Isaiah are made true and lasting — and nations never again lift up swords against nations and never learn war anymore — we will need peacekeepers. Lord knows, ours are not perfect, and I already have moved to remedy inexcusable excesses we’ve perpetrated in the war on terrorism.

“But have no doubt, those are the exception. If you want to see the true essence of America, visit any U.S. military outpost in Iraq or Afghanistan. You will meet young men and women of every race and religion who work together as one, far from their families, motivated chiefly by their mission to keep the peace and expand the borders of freedom.

“So for all these reasons — and so you understand that I will never hesitate to call on American soldiers where necessary to take the field against the enemies of peace, tolerance and liberty — I accept this peace prize on behalf of the men and women of the U.S. military: the world’s most important peacekeepers.”

Yeager, who flew 50 fighter missions in New Guinea in 1943, received the Distinguished Flying Cross, which is awarded to those who show heroism or great achievement while flying.

“It’s an honor to have people recognize what you’ve done in the past,” said the 88-year-old retired Air Force colonel, with the blue and red medal pinned to his sport-coat pocket.

Yeager received more than 10 decorations for his Air Force service, but the Distinguished Flying Cross award eluded him. He filed the paperwork for the award in 1943, months after he bailed out of a bullet-riddled P-38 Lightning and parachuted into the New Guinea jungle.

He served in the 9th Fighter Squadron, 49th Fighter Group, between March and November 1943.

Yeager’s wife pinned the medal on his jacket, next to his bright blue tie of a P-38.

Yeager said that one day he wants his medals and military records to be displayed somehow.

“When I die, I want it in an historical place,” Yeager said. “It’s important.”

Last Weeks Meeting

At last weeks meeting Collin County Commissioner – Precent 2, Jerry Hoagland and District Blood Drive Chairman George Elking spoke to our group about a proposal to develop an Intermodal Transportation Center in Collin County. Collin County Commissioner Jerry Hoagland is working on a project he says could be the biggest thing to hit Collin County, potentially creating 30,000 to 50,000 jobs.

The project involves an intermodal facility, a transportation hub where ground, rail and air components converge to handle foreign shipments of goods, on the eastern side of the county in Wylie. The facility would be similar to Alliance Airport in Tarrant County.
